Know your Scottish Polymer £50 notes - Information for Retailers

The Polymer £50 notes issued by the Scottish Banks feature the following security features: -

- 1) **Clear Window(s)**
- 2) **Spark feature - Colour Changing ink Gold to Green** (Bank of Scotland)
- 3) **Holographic Foil**
- 4) **Raised Print / Text** – 'Name of the Bank'

Details of other security features such as additional areas of **raised** print, **UV** features, etc. can be found by following the link below each note (as shown above)

- 1) **Clear Window.** There is a clear polymer window on the left of each note. Additional windows can be found on the Bank of Scotland note.
Bank of Scotland -There are clear windows within the building (Bank's Headquarters on 'The Mound') in the centre of note. The 'BoS logo' (diagonal cross) in the lower part of the hologram is also a see through (window)
- 2) **Spark® feature.** The Bank of Scotland note features a spark feature which is printed in shiny metallic ink that changes colour from Gold to Green – Figure 50.

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- 3) **Holographic Foil.** Both notes feature a **Silver holographic foil strip**. If you tilt the note from side to side the images will move (e.g., On the Bank of Scotland note, Clouds move left to right behind the statue / head and on the Royal Bank of Scotland note, the 50 moves from side to side) and colours change in the images. The holographic foil is visible from the front and back of the note.
- 4) **Raised Print.** Both notes feature areas of raised print. The name of the Bank is in Raised print . Details of other area of raised print can be found by checking the link(s) on Page 1

The absence of these security features in notes passed for payment indicate that they are in fact counterfeit. Consideration should be given to contacting the Police to report the matter as a crime.

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The current series of £20 notes issued by the Scottish Banks feature the following security features:

- 1) **Clear Window(s)**
- 2) **Spark® feature – Colour Changing ink Purple to Gold**
- 3) **Holographic Foil** - (Bank of Scotland & Clydesdale Bank)
- 4) **Iridescence ('shimmering' gold ink)**– (Royal Bank of Scotland)

Details of other security features such as raised print, UV features, etc. can be found by following the link below each note (as shown on page 1).

- 1) **Clear Window.** There is a clear polymer window on the left of each note. Additional windows can be found on both the Bank of Scotland and Clydesdale Banks notes.
Bank of Scotland -There are clear windows within the building (Bank's Headquarters on 'The Mound' in centre of note). The 'BoS logo' ('diagonal cross') in the lower part of hologram is also see through (window)
Clydesdale Banks - A larger second window can be found on the right of the note that runs vertically; within the window you will see the hologram.
- 2) **Spark® feature.** The notes each feature a spark feature which is printed in shiny metallic ink that changes colour from purple to gold on all 3 notes. You will also see an orbital effect ('movement') as you tilt the Clydesdale Bank and Royal Bank of Scotland notes.
- 3) **Holographic Foil.** Bank of Scotland and Clydesdale Bank notes each feature a Silver holographic foil strip. If you tilt the note from side to side the images will move (e.g. Clouds from left to right behind statue / head and in Clydesdale note the Spider moves across web) and colours change in the images. The holographic foil is clearly visible from the front and back of the note.
- 4) **Iridescence.** The Royal Bank of Scotland note features iridescence ('shimmering'), a shiny band of gold coloured iridescent ink which can be clearly seen when you move the note around. The band runs from the left of the note, across the window to the portrait; a small section of the band is also visible on the right-hand edge of the note.

The absence of these security features in notes passed for payment indicate that they are in fact to be regarded as counterfeit. Consideration should be given to contacting the Police to report the matter as a crime.
